HOW DO I GET MY TICKET?

An e-mail confirmation will be automatically sent from our ticketing partner, e-tix. The e-mail will include a link to view/print your tickets. Please print, screenshot, or add to your digital wallet prior to coming to the Fair!

DO I HAVE TO PRINT MY TICKET?

Nope! Mobile tickets can be scanned at the gates, right from your phone! If you open the "View My Tickets" link on a mobile device, the mobile version of the ticket comes up. It also gives you the option to save the ticket right on your homescreen or add to your Apple Wallet! *Important:* Tickets <u>cannot</u> be printed from a mobile device, as the layout has been optimized for presentation on a phone. If you want printed tickets, please open the link on a desktop or laptop computer and print from there.

WHAT IF I LOST MY E-MAIL OR DIDN'T RECEIVE IT?

No problem! First, check your junk mail just in case. If you still cannot locate your ticket e-mail, just call the Fair Office (636-239-2715) and the confirmation e-mail can be re-sent to you.

I SAW DISCOUNTED TICKETS OFFERED AT AN ONLINE SWAP SHOP... IS IT VALID?

We <u>do not</u> recommend purchasing tickets from places other than our authorized ticket system (washmofair. com, e-tix.com). If an unauthorized seller sold a ticket to multiple people, the ticket may be listed as "re-deemed" when you arrive at the fair. Since tickets will scan only once at the gate, people who arrive at the gate with a ticket that has already been redeemed must purchase a valid ticket from the gatehouse before entering the fair.

GENERAL RULES + REGULATIONS

I. INTERPRETATION AND VIOLATION OF RULES

The Washington Town & Country Fair Board reserves the right to interpret the following rules and regulations and determine all matters pertaining thereto; also the right to amend or add such rules as its judgment might determine. Violation of any of these regulations shall cause forfeiture of all privileges, deposits, premiums, contracts, and right to participation by violator. This shall apply to all departments of the Washington Town & Country Fair. Money raffles, games of chance with money payoffs or awards, cash lotteries, or any other gambling activities prohibited by state law shall be prohibited on or about the fairgrounds.

2. LIABILITY OF EXHIBITORS

In no case shall the Washington Town & Country Fair, or any of its officers or directors, be held responsible for any loss, damage, injury, or death by disease, theft, or from any other cause of any character, to any property while the same is on the Fairgrounds. The Washington Town & Country Fair, its directors and officers, hereby assume no responsibility either as a bailee or otherwise, for any property brought upon said Fairgrounds, and it shall be at owner's risk.

3. CLAIMS FOR INJURY

No claims for injury to any person or property shall ever be asserted, nor suit instituted or maintained against the Washington Town & Country Fair, or its officers or their agents, representatives, volunteers, or employees. If any damage, loss, or injury to person or property shall be caused by reason of any neglect or willful acts of any persons, firm, or corporation or their agents, representatives, volunteers, or employees having license or privilege to exhibit on said Fairgrounds, or occupying a space thereon, the Washington Town & Country Fair shall, in no manner, be responsible therefore, and in case it be subject to any expenses or liability all persons causing same or liable therefore, shall indemnify the said Washington Town & Country Fair, Washington, Missouri.

4. UNCLAIMED EXHIBITS

Competitive exhibits which have not been claimed by the exhibitor at the close of the Fair will be considered to have been abandoned and will be disposed of as the Fair Board may see fit.

5. JUDGING OF EXHIBITS AND CONTESTS

Judges have been selected by the Fair Board. Each judge is capable of making expert decisions in the respective area for which they are chosen. All exhibitors and contestants in the Fair shall accept these judges and agree to abide by their decision. Event time schedules are printed on the event catalog page. The decision of the judge(s) will be final in all cases.

6. PREMIUMS AND AWARDS

Premiums and awards will be made only to exhibitors listed in the classifications contained in this premium book. The judge(s) may recommend no premium, third, second, or first place according to the merit of the exhibit.

7. PAYMENT OF PREMIUMS

Premium vouchers must be picked up at the times listed in the Schedule of Events. Home Economic-Fine Arts and Horticulture-Floriculture vouchers not picked up at the fair and cashed at the bank on the fairgrounds will be forfeited.

8. TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

Any person obstructing any fire lane, drive or street with a vehicle will be requested by the police to remove the vehicle immediately. Failure to do so will result in expulsion from the grounds and/or arrest. VEHICLES PARKED IN RESTRICTED AREAS OR POSING A HAZARD MAY BE TOWED AT OWNER'S EXPENSE. AMPLE PARKING SPACE IS PROVIDED FOR ALL VEHICLES. SPECIAL AREAS HAVE BEEN DESIGNATED FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS, EMPLOYEES, OFFICIALS AND VOLUNTEERS.

GENERAL RULES + REGULATIONS (contd)

9. GROUNDS REGULATIONS

No coolers or cans, will be allowed on the fairgrounds. Coolers and cans will be confiscated at the gate. One UNOPENED water bottle will be allowed through the gate with each person. Proper clothing must be worn on Fairgrounds. Patrons must wear shoes, pants and shirt, or risk expulsion from the grounds. No pets will be allowed on the grounds! No skateboards, bicycles, or scooters allowed on the Fairgrounds. NO WEAPONS OF <u>ANY KIND</u> MAY BE BROUGHT ON TO THE GROUNDS. Gate Security will be checking bags that are brought onto the grounds. No bullhorns, megaphones, or any other types of loud speaker systems will be allowed onto the fairgrounds. Selling fair tickets on the fairgrounds or in the parking lots is strictly prohibited. Absolutely no information of any kind is allowed to be distributed on the fairgrounds without prior approval. Selfie-sticks are not allowed on the fairgrounds. Any unauthorized drones will be confiscated.

Entry forms and/or registration links for all exhibitor divisions and contests may be obtained at www. washmofair.com. Copies are also available at the Washington Area Chamber of Commerce for classes/ events that do not require online registration.

II. HOURS OF THE FAIR

The fair will be open daily from 7:00 a.m. until midnight starting Wednesday, August 2, 2023, through Saturday, August 5, 2023 and from 7:00 a.m. until 10:00 p.m. Sunday, August 6, 2023. In the event that hours are altered due to weather or other unforeseen circumstances, no refunds or rainchecks will be issued.

 - D) 9,501-11,500 lbs.* 125 HP 20.8x38 tire size**
 - E) 11,501-13,500 lbs.* 155 HP 20.8x42 tire size**
 - F) 13,501-17,000 lbs.* 180 HP 24.5×42 tire size**

*Weight of tractor includes driver **Tires must be of proper size or the equivalent. Formula to determine equivalent: (width x 2) + diameter

- Drawbar height limit will be 21 inches. Minimum length of drawbar will be 20 inches from center of rear axle. <u>All tractors must use clevis with 3-inch</u> opening or hitch with 3-inch opening allowing hook to swing free.
- 5. Rear tractor weights cannot interfere with hooking of sled. Three pt. weights must be turned so the heaviest side is to the inside of tractor-not sled.
- 6. FUEL: One fuel only Gas, LP, or Diesel. Only factory fuel pumps for make and model of tractor.
- 7. A dynamometer will be used to check the top five (5) pullers in each class. All tractors must have PTO shaft. All tractors over 120 HP must have 1,000 RPM-PTO shaft. Engines not to exceed 10% above factory governed high-idle on tractors with a factory governed high-idle in excess of 2,000 RPM and 20% above factory governed at less than 2,000 RPM. High-idle and PTO-HP will be determined by a dynamometer using the Nebraska Test Book as a guideline for the make, model, and serial number for that tractor regardless of engine. NO tolerance will be allowed on HP and RPM. All hand and/or foot throttles may be checked for proper operation at judges discretion.
- 8. Removal of items such as hoods and other items which may create a safety hazard will not be allowed. All tractors must use two front wheels.

Any art form which has been copied from other art forms will be dropped down in merit on the judges' decision.
- 5. For exhibitors in the Food Preparation Category: All entries (E200-E224) must be on disposable plates. The Washington Town & Country Fair will not be held responsible for loss of non-disposable dishes brought in with entries. Exhibitors may want to enter food items on Tuesday so that they are more visually presentable to the judges.
- 6. Neither directors, officials, or officers of the Washington Town & Country Fair will be held responsible for damage or loss of exhibits.
- 7. The Home Economics Committee will have the final decision on all questions, disputes, hardship cases, etc., that may develop.


